Let's Take A Trip Down Memory Lane!

Part 1 of "Do You Remember When? Or "Did You Know?"

Our journey begins in 1937. Cartoon characters Daffy Duck, Elmer J. Fudd and Petunia Pig, debuts. Henry Ford initiates the 32 hour work week AND on June 6, 1937—The Caswell County Department of Social Services was initially organized in a joint meeting of the Caswell County Board of Commissioners and the County Board of Charities & Public Welfare. Ms. Margaret H. Wilson was appointed Superintendent of the new department for a two year term. Her salary was \$1,500 per year. The total first year budget for the department was \$9,280. The other member of the staff at that time was a caseworker who was employed at a salary of \$1,020 per year.

November 1937—Tight budgets and money was evident from the beginning. Minutes of the Welfare Board for November 1937 reveal the adoption of a policy "that the Board not approve two grants, in the same family until all applicants have been investigated."

Our journey continues into 1938. March of Dimes is established to fight Polio and a 500 ton meteorite lands near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and on November 29, 1938—Early roles and responsibilities of Board Members and the Department were evolving. At a meeting of the Board on November 29, 1938, Mrs. Wilson asked Board Members to use every opportunity to interpret the work of the Welfare Department to the public. They were also reminded of their "advisory function:". Payments for the first Welfare Board were established at \$3,36 for each member per meeting with mileage being reimbursed at 4 cents per mile.

The State Board of Charities in early 1939 communicated with the Board that they were anxious that the average payment for recipients be raised. During these early years, the Board established quotas on the number of clients to be given payment. Additional individuals in need were placed on a waiting list. Also during the year of

1939, the daily newspaper comic strip "Superman" debuts and Frank Sinatra made his recording debut and on November 21, 1939—The need for birth control services for Caswell County clients was discussed at a Board Meeting.

Mrs. Margaret H. Wilson, the county's first Superintendent of Public Welfare, resigned on February 1, 1940 to accept employment within the State. Mrs. Wilson later served the county as a Field Representative from the State Board of Welfare.

I hope you are buckled in! As with any productive road trip, our journey has just begun and our destination to the year 2013 will be pleasantly endured as we continue to ride through the years, reliving events and learning of names (maybe your relatives) that were vital in the history of the Caswell County Department of Social Services. Settle in for the trip ahead. ROAD TRIP.....



Caswell County Heritage Festival

Caswell County Heritage Festival!
May 18, 2013 from 9:00 – 2:00 Town Square,
Yanceyville, NC
(Will be held regardless of weather)
There is no charge to attend the festival. However, some contests and activities may require tickets, which can be purchased in the museum the day of the festival.
Step back in time with the Caswell County Historical Association's Heritage Festival! During the 1800s, Caswell County was one of the wealthiest counties in North Carolina. The tobacco industry was booming and Caswell County was a leader in the field! Several historic buildings will be open and available to walk through. Tour the Historic Courthouse, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, which is architecturally considered one of the most distinctive courthouses in North Carolina. See the jail (with workable, but not working gallows). Visit the Richmond-Miles History Museum and one-room schoolhouse.
Many Caswell County citizens were prominent, well-known figures during the 1800s and their stories will be told throughout the day, so there will be plenty to keep you busy: Meet John "Chicken" Stephens (or perhaps his ghost) at the Historic Courthouse and see the room where he was murdered. Witness the historic

trial of Henrietta Jefferies in the second floor courtroom. Hear Calvin Graves and Josiah Rucks make speeches. Listen to gospel singing and preaching on the square. Talk to Sheriff Frank Wiley and a prisoner in the old jail house. Meet Stephen Slade and learn how, as a slave, he accidentally invented flue-cured tobacco here in Caswell County and revolutionized the industry. Listen to William Percival talk about designing the Historic Courthouse. Watch re-enactments of the Civil War behind the museum.
Centered in the 1800s, the festival will display basket weaving, leathersmithing, quilting, gunsmithing, blacksmithing, and tating, all from that era. See antique farm equipment, tools, and fire equipment. Take a pony ride and go for a hayride. No matter what you decide to do, the festival will be full of activities for both children and adults. Listen to bluegrass music at the town pavilion. Meet local farmers. Enjoy lunch from local restaurants located around the square. Visit a local farm (just a few minutes down Main street) and meet Wilbur the pig, see how horseshoes are made and watch a cow being milked. There will also be children's stories and

games (all free), including three-legged races, hoop rolling, and horseshoes. Contests for adults include hay bale tossing, horseshoe tossing, and tobacco spitting (must pre-register to enter contest.) There will be a fee to enter the contests, with the winner of each receiving half the proceeds.
An auction will take place on the town square at 1:00! Items donated to the festival will be auctioned off to help support the Historical Association. Items include a child's birthday pony ride, gift certificate to The Sweetery, and an antique handmade knife. If you are interested in donating items or services to the auction, please bring them to the library. Items will be displayed in the windows of Watlington's store on the day of the festival.
Join us in celebrating the strengths of our past and enjoy a relaxing day strolling down memory lane. Come as you are, or dress the part! Any donations to help support the Historical Association would be greatly appreciated. The festival was organized by the Caswell County Historical Association, with collaboration from the Caswell County Public Library. The Caswell County Historical Association appreciates all the participation and assistance from everyone that has supported this event!!
