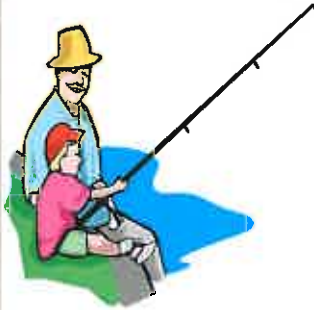

Re: New Fishing License Requirement

During its 2005 Session, the General Assembly made a number of changes to North Carolina's fishing license require-

ments. Senate Bill 1126, among other things, requires a Coastal Recreational Fishing License (CRFL) for anyone wanting to fish recreationally in North Carolina's coastal waters. In addition, the new legislation repeals the natural-bait exemption for freshwater fishing in public waters. Beginning **January 1, 2007**, anyone fishing in North Carolina (with the exception of private ponds) in North Carolina must have a fishing license. The only exceptions are children under 16 and people who receive Food Stamps, Medicaid, or Work First Family Assistance.

(d) Resident Subsistence Unified Inland/Coastal Recreational Fishing License Waiver. - A county department of social services shall issue a Resident Subsistence

Unified Inland/Coastal Recreational Fishing License Waiver to an individual who receives benefits from Medicaid, Food Stamps, or Work First Family Assistance through the county department of social services and who requests a waiver. This waiver shall be issued at no charge. This waiver is valid for a period of one year from the date of issuance. This waiver shall be issued only to an individual who is a resident of the State. This waiver authorizes the waiver holder to fish with hook and line for all fish in all inland fishing waters and joint fishing waters, except for public mountain trout waters, and to engage in recreational fishing in coastal fishing waters. County departments of social services shall supply the Wildlife Resources Commission with the name, mailing address, and telephone number of each individual who receives a waiver."

Emergency Management

On May 22, 2012 Emergency Management took ownership of a CAMET (Companion Animal Materials Equipment Trailer). The purchase was made using Department of Homeland Security funds at no cost to the county. This will be a great asset for Caswell County in the event we have a disaster. We put in a request for this equipment after we realized that we could not meet the new requirements that

were put in place by the Federal Government which states that you must have a means to take care of the pets of anyone that comes to an emergency shelter. The former plan states that these animals would have been taken to the local animal shelter. Our concern was that our local shelter only had very few spaces available. The CAMET has enough kennels and equipment

to handle 55 to 110 animals depending on their size. This is also a state deployable asset and may be requested to be sent anywhere in the state. The CAMET, like all other emergency equipment, cannot be deployed to another area if Caswell County is affected by the disaster. We have first priority for any Emergency Management equipment.

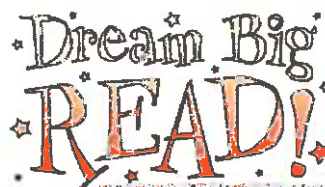

Computers and Heat

It's the warm time of the year again and no doubt you feel it.

Your computer feels it too. As time goes on computers accumulate dust inside.

Computers by nature are dust magnets. They have fans that pull air into the cases and along with it all the dust around them. Even if you keep an area spotless your PC is going to find some dust to accumulate.

In the cooler months of the year it's harder to see the effects of a plugged up PC.

Some signs your PC needs a cleaning:

-Loud whirring noise (Fans spinning at max speed to compensate for high temp)

-PC is sometimes slow to respond once it is running 15 minutes or longer

-Putting your hand at the back of the PC you feel little to no air

-Feeling the side of the case you feel a lot of heat in the upper area

So what to do?

There are a couple ways to do this, one of which is easy and another which is not so easy due to potential for damage.

The safest way is to use a can of compressed air. Take the cover off your PC and blow the air into any area that has a fan. Of special interest is the CPU fan, case fans and power supply. See the pictures below for a general idea. Simply blow off these areas and prepare for flying dust. Be careful when you use the air and use it in short bursts or else the can gets cold and releases less pressure.

Next time we will discuss the not so easy way to do this.

To qualify for the Advanced Deputy Professional Law Enforcement Certificate, sheriffs and deputy sheriffs must complete a combination of professional training and relevant education, as well as, meet minimum experience requirements.

The Vow – Inspired by the true story of Kim and Krickitt Carpenter. (DVDs check out from the library free for 1 week)

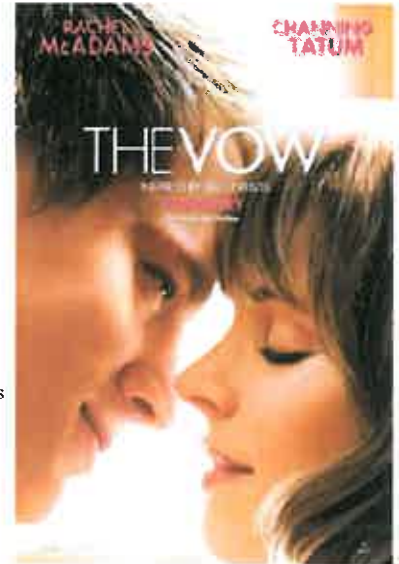
Rated PG-13, 6.6 stars
