

A Message from the County Commissioners



County Manager, Bryan Miller, completed the County Administration course at the UNC School of Government in May. Bryan began this course in September 2014 and finished in April 2015. This course is designed for county managers, department heads, and other county officials whose responsibilities require understanding the functions beyond individual areas of specialization. This program gives you the chance to: Understand the legal framework and administrative requirements of North Carolina county government; Learn about how specific county services are organized and provided; Appreciate the interrelation among different activities or departments and how specific laws, programs, and functions contribute to the achievement of the overall mission of a local government; and Become part of a broader network of local government peers on whom participants will be able to draw for assistance in the future. Some of the major course subject areas that Bryan took were in Local Government Law which broadly encompassed a variety of critical topics including open meetings and public records laws and purchasing and contracting laws, as well as laws covering the disposal of public property; Organization & Management which took an extensive and in-depth look at the basic functions and structure of local governments in North Carolina and the United States and at complex in intergovernmental relationships, including aspects of regionalism, which guide the way we govern; Finance & Budgeting which explored the constitutional and statutory aspects of government finance in North Carolina in addition to the tax and public finance systems that furnish the foundation of public administration; Public Employment Law which impacts every aspects of local government administration and management; Planning & Regulation of Development which delved into issues and implications of the county planning functions together with environmental law and planning; and County Services where he investigated the laws and issues relevant to organizing and providing county services in North Carolina local government.

Electronics Have Feelings Too- Sort Of

As the weather turns warm we are all doing more. We are going places, spending time outside , etc. It's during the warmer months that people tend to leave electronics in their vehicles, out on the deck, or otherwise in a hot place.

Electronics including cell phones, tablets, laptops, USB drives, anything electronic pretty much are not tolerant to extreme temps.

Heat is the enemy of your electronics in many ways. A vehicle in the warm/hot months can reach well over 120+ degrees inside.

Leaving your electronics inside for any amount of time beyond an hour is not a good habit to get into. Never leave your devices in direct sunlight for any length of time for sure, and keep in mind what can happen with just leaving it in a hot place for over an hour.

Some of the things that can happen are:

- cracked screens
- reduced long term battery life and capacity due to heat
- reduced hard drive life
- warped plastic components

It's just as bad to keep electronics in your vehicle during the winter at or below freezing levels. When you go from freezing cold to operating temp inside the device too quickly, condensation can form and cause all sorts of problems.

The safest bet is to take your devices with you when you can, and if you have to leave your electronics in the car for any amount of time over an hour, either leave them at home or office and when you do bring them in allow another hour for them to acclimate to the new environment before powering up. With all the things we use our electronics for, and how much they cost taking into consideration their limits once in a while can extend the time they are working at an optimum level for us. It will also extend their service life.

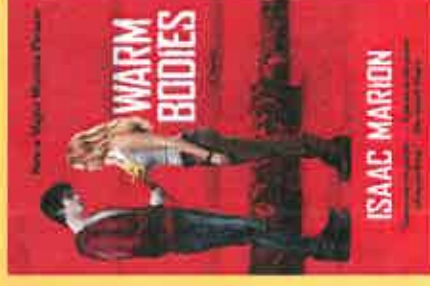
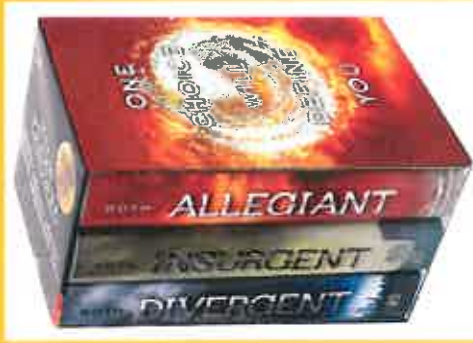

Fearless Caregiver Conference

As many of you have seen in your email, mailboxes and across town, the Caswell Senior Services and Piedmont Triad Regional Council Area Agency on Aging recently partnered with Today's Caregiver magazine to host the 152nd Fearless Caregiver Conference. Until joining the Caswell Senior Services team in November, I had never heard of these conferences or thought about what it meant to be a caregiver. I've always helped take care of my grandparents – taking them to appointments, helping them around the house, etc. Let me just say, I have become a master decorator and wrapper during the holidays at my Granny's. But I was never a caregiver until the last two years when my role increased with my Pawpaw. Let me explain. You see my Pawpaw was a fighter. He'd battled back from numerous heart attacks, congestive heart failure, two VAD (ventricular assistive device), and strokes. After his second VAD device was implanted, he was different. His memory was slipping, his temperament fragile. He rarely left the house. His appetite varied. My grandmother cared for him around the clock – administering meds, changing his batteries, adjusting his hearing aids so he might be able to understand her. I think you can understand, it was job and it was taking a toll on her. I decided I needed to step up. I would come in during the week and “kick” her out of the house. Tell her to go shopping. Visit friends. Just get out of the house. It was then that I bonded with my Pawpaw – more than I can ever remember as a child. I'd fix him lunch and we would watch Wendy Williams and the Talk, ensuring we stayed on top of the latest gossip and fashion trends. We watched westerns and action movies, “shoot-em-up bang bang” movies as he called them. When TV wasn't stealing our attention we exercised. Pawpaw had been ordered 8 weeks of physical therapy after his second VAD. But I knew that wasn't enough and once the sessions ran out he'd stay in his favorite recliner for hours on end. His physical therapist and I spoke, and with my degree and certification I was permitted to continue his therapy once his sessions ended. We did laps, squats, knee extensions, hamstring curls, marched in place, and more laps. He'd stand up, I would tell him, “take off” and before he made it to the kitchen his pants were falling and it was a full moon. He'd cut corners like a NASCAR driver. We couldn't help but laugh. Then it was time to “take a break”. That was always his favorite – he'd repeat the words back with a smile. My Meme started telling everyone I could get him to do whatever I wanted – get him out of bed, up and walking, eating, or outside. That was before he really started to decline. My Pawpaw passed away in April of this year. And like anyone else who has lost loved ones, it has been a struggle.

I tell you this story to tell you the one thing I that stuck with me from the Fearless Caregiver Conference – remember the good times with your loved ones and laugh. I try not to think about his last few days when he was in pain and just wanted to go Home. I remember him in his garden. I remember him working on this old Ford pickup. I remember him shooting guns with my brother. I remember him blowing silks off corn with an air compressor because it was “faster” than using his hands. I remember my little Richard Petty cutting corners with his walker, pants halfway to his knees. But most of all I remember his smile. The smile I see every time I look at my dad.

Being a caregiver is both a struggle and a reward. You are with them through everything – and everything affects you in some form or fashion. Something I did not understand until a few years ago, something that was not reiterated until June 10 at the Fearless Caregiver. But I would do it all again because the bond and memories I made are priceless.
